Curtin has CECs at RPH, QEII, Graylands, Fremantle Hospital, Osborne Park Hospital, Therapy Focus, Amana Living, and other centres - 19 in total. The meeting was an opportunity for CECs to share ideas, offer suggestions to the fieldwork team and register any problems. From feedback, it is clear that the CEC programme is operating beautifully. The School of OT would like to thank the fieldwork team - in particular Nigel Gribble, Sharon Keesing and Carol Mulkearns for their dedication and hard work. Their dedicated work has certainly made a difference to students, supervising therapists and host facilities.

Our heartiest congratulations to Associate Professor Samar Aoun who has been awarded the prestigious Paul Harris Fellow Medal in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the community and to Rotary. Rotary awarded Associate Professor Aoun the Paul Harris Fellow Medal not only for her pioneering work on the Waist Disposal Challenge but also in recognition of her extensive community involvement.

Samar has been actively involved in community and population health for many years and currently works for the Centre for Research into Disability and Society (CRDS), School of Occupational Therapy and the WA Centre for Cancer and Palliative Care (WACCPC), both based at Curtin. On this note, we want to congratulate Marina Ciccarelli, lecturer in the School, who presented a paper at the 8th International Work Congress in Durban South Africa. The paper entitled 'Minimising work stress: how can good corporate citizens achieve this?' was co-authored by our colleagues from the School, namely Trevor Goddard and Judith Merritt. Graduate Entry Masters (GEM) Programme Accreditation

'Occupational therapists as health professional have a responsibility to the individual, community and the profession to provide ethical, safe, beneficial and competent health care which is responsive to needs. The community has the right to expect that professionals providing occupational therapy services do so in a competent and contemporary manner' (Course Accreditation Manual 2004, p.5).

As such, accreditation is the primary means by which the profession demonstrates the effective establishment and maintenance of standards of practice; it's a way that the profession can self-regulate.

On 9, 10 and 11 April 2008 the graduate-entry Master of Occupational Therapy program will undergo re-accreditation by OT Australia (representing the World Federation of Occupational Therapists as well). Over the two days, the team of accreditors will meet with staff, students, graduates and members of the clinical community, as well as the Pro Vice-Chancellor Health Sciences and the Associate Dean Teaching and Learning.
